#### 1.0 Introduction

- 1.1 I have a particular interest in the salmon farm relocation proposal because the initiative supports better environmental, economic and social outcomes for Marlborough and New Zealand. I participated in the Marlborough salmon working group and as such I'm very familiar with the content of the substantive range of expert reports commissioned to assess the issues, impacts and potential implications of farm relocations. It is clear from the technical reports that a move to hi-flow locations will materially mitigate the negative environmental impacts and limitations of the current low-flow farms. Any move to hi-flow sites would be undertaken in a very measured and controlled 'adaptive management' process that will ensure farms are operated within environmental limits and consent conditions. Additional hi flow sites were considered but were discounted as less suitable by the working group for a range of reasons.
- 1.2 I support the submission of Aquaculture New Zealand (AQNZ).
- 1.3 I would like to speak to my written comments at a public hearing.

#### 2.0 Expression of General Support

- 2.1 I support the principles of the proposed salmon farm relocation regulation and plan changes.
- 2.2 Aquaculture makes a significant contribution to the communities of the Marlborough region and salmon farming is an important part of this, offering stable skilled employment and supporting a range of local business and community activities.
- 2.3 The New Zealand aquaculture industry respects and values the waters it farms in and is well known for producing high quality seafood with the lightest touch on the environment. Salmon farming is one of the most sustainable sources of quality protein on the planet and this has been recognized through Monterey Bay Aquarium's Seafood Watch 'Best Choice' rating.
- 2.4 New Zealand's King (Chinook) salmon is recognised both at home and worldwide as the 'champagne' species of salmon and is highly valued across a range of consumers, from kiwi backyard BBQs to Michelin starred restaurants. It is also packed full of essential nutrients and has one of the highest natural oil contents of all salmon varieties, making it a quality source of Omega 3s.
- 2.5 Salmon farming is an industry we can be proud of and at the same time be excited about for our future.

#### 3.0 Key Messages

- 3.1 I agree with the potential benefits that have been identified in the proposal, particularly to:
  - 3.1.1. Ensure the environmental outcomes from salmon farming are improved through implementation of benthic best management practice; "In 2012, Professor Kenneth Black of the Scottish Association of Marine Sciences, an internationally recognised authority on aquaculture, reported that higher-flow sites are better for growing healthy salmon, and reducing environmental effects in the Marlborough Sounds."
  - 3.1.2. Improve the social and cultural outcomes from salmon farming by moving farms away from populated bays and areas of high competing use reducing visual, noise and odour intrusion.
  - 3.1.3. Increase the economic benefits accruing from salmon farming including Incremental skilled and specialist jobs in the top of the South and broader economic benefits to associated industries.
- 3.2 The particular principles I support include:
  - 3.2.1 Support for the Best Management Practice guidelines for salmon farms in the Marlborough Sounds which were developed collaboratively with the community and experts to ensure well managed salmon farming in balance with the ecology of the Marlborough Sounds.

- 3.2.2 Recognition that a better operating environment, ie higher flow, cooler water, means better environmental, operational and animal husbandry outcomes for salmon farming in general and particularly for New Zealand's King (Chinook) salmon species.
- 3.2.3 Recognition that low flow, warmer sites constrain the ability for a salmon farming operation to meet the Best Management Practice guidelines while maintaining economic viability.
- 3.2.4 Recognition that the substantial suite of analysis that guides the proposal serves to strengthen knowledge and understanding of and for the salmon industry in general and that this brings broader opportunities for New Zealand as a whole.
- 3.2.5 Support for the robust and comprehensive analysis and consultation being carried out as part of the Resource Management Act (RMA) s360 process.

To whom it may concern,

I am in favour of the proposal for NZ King Salmon to relocate their sites to a more suitable location. Reasoning behind my favourable submission are threefold; I care about the environment where I work and play, I believe the community will benefit from a boost in local jobs and I strongly believe in our world class product both here and representing NZ abroad.

#### **Environmental**

I work in Nelson but often travel to the Sounds for work. The area is stunning! I predominantly work on the Regal Marlborough King Salmon brand. Part of my job is to market the Sounds as it is one our unique selling propositions to be the only company to farm in this area. We sell our salmon based on how beautiful the area is. We also sell the salmon based on our environmental accreditations. We need to ensure that we keep the area beautiful to continue selling this message and ensure we meet our environmental obligations.

Another aspect of my job is to show customers, bloggers, NZ chef celebrities, international chefs and media to the Sounds and take them out to the farms. These are mostly overseas or out of town visitors who have often never been to the area. Often blown away by the beauty of the area they will rave about it to their friends and colleagues and often post on social media or in other forms of media (radio, tv, magazines etc). This will undoubtedly have an effect on bringing tourism to the area.

Outside of work I am very much into the outdoors and spend a lot of my personal time camping, kayaking and fishing in the Sounds. Much of the reason I do this along with many other locals and tourists is to enjoy the beauty of the water and the area in general.

Moving to high flow sites will ensure that we can have a reduced amount of waste on the seabed floor and be able to maintain the Sounds for the future of not only our brand with consumers, inviting visitors to the area but also for recreational use for generations to come.

#### Local Community/Economy

I'm a 25 year old and starting working at King salmon at the age of 23, relatively fresh out of university. I studied in Wellington and worked there for a few years with the biggest reason being there weren't a lot of jobs for people with higher education in the Top of the South. While I really enjoyed my time, it was really expensive and meant I had no choice to move away from my family and friends in the region. Also giving up playing for a higher level of sport which I was involved with at the time. When I came back to see my family after an extended holiday/travel I was quite shocked to see a role such as Assistant Brand Manager for a large company based in Nelson, my home, and immediately applied. Since then I have been exposed to a tremendous amount of opportunity within the company and get to work

on a world class brand. I hope that companies like NZ King salmon can continue to grow and employ more skilled workers such as myself so we don't have to move into large cities or even further to companies overseas. Please find attached my submission in SUPPORT of the MPI initiative.

I make this submission in SUPPORT of the initiative to relocate salmon farms in the Marlborough Sounds by terminating historical sites in favour of sites at new locations that are more aligned with:

- · the needs of good biological growth for King Salmon and consequent economic merit
- · a less intrusive location for other users of the Marlborough Sounds
- a reduced effect on the environment

This is my personal submission.

I am a current director of The New Zealand King Salmon Investments Limited having served since 2008 when Direct Capital became a 45.0% shareholder in the company.

The key message is the NZ salmon species is rare and, as it has transpired from years of effort, challenging to farm.

Our species may be rare yet presents some unique nutritional benefits not least of which are its high Omega content. Its presentation, colour, raw preference for sushi, mouth feel and utility for cooked presentation is prized by chefs the world over and as such demands a substantial premium over all other salmon species. This has enabled our company to concentrate on its market growth while processes under the EPA for additional allocations have been draining against those market gains.

Strong empirical evidence has been gathered that water quality, type and site location are key factors in a beneficial grow out of our King Salmon. Current/water flow, temperature, light, sunshine, water clarity and oxygen, predator avoidance (above and below water) and general stability of conditions are among the many important elements we have observed for optimal King salmon rearing. Our pioneering sites did not have the benefit of such knowledge.

Equally the need to have supportive site conditions bestows a similar stewardship need over the environment within which the site is located. We have been supportive and determined to ensure the best practice guidelines are able to be demonstrated 24/7. It sets us apart from farming practices elsewhere in the world where vaccines and medicines are used.

Our farming of King Salmon is a country and community 'good' activity. It provides substantial foreign earnings; employment both internally and externally; generates significant GNP; invests in community support projects and causes; and seeks to be a positive corporate citizen while providing an economical highly nutritional and tasty diet protein.

New Zealand has a very small marine aquaculture footprint by comparison to other countries whether they be growing salmon, shellfish or other species. We are proud of what we achieve and equally proud of our environment.

The relocation of historic salmon farm sites to researched empathetic new locations is a positive low impact development - good for the industry, the community, the country.

Accordingly, I SUPPORT and urge approval of this initiative by Minister of Primary Industries.

I do not seek to make verbal representations to the panel of resource management experts.
