To whom it may concern,

I would like to make the following submissions:

- Section 4.1.5 defences, question 13
 "the defendant took all reasonable steps to comply with the relevant provision; or the act or omission constituting the offence took place in circumstances of stress or emergency and was necessary for the preservation, protection, or maintenance of human life." To extend this to include "or animal life". There are already provisions for transporting, or not, certain animals in certain emergency situations to a vet clinic for example elsewhere in Welfare codes.
- Section 5.2 questions 15 and 16 "where a regulation contains a higher standard than a minimum standard the minimum standard will be revoked or amended to avoid contradiction; and/or" I support this option. I also think that it should clearly state that something is prohibited and failure to comply can carry a fine. This may be in the front of the codes as part of a glossary i.e.. What does prohibited mean? What happens if I fail to comply?
- Section 10 Care and Conduct Regulatory Proposals
- 4. Dogs Pinch and Prong collars
 I agree with the proposal for these to become a prohibited item.
- Should this area be regulated? Yes
- What would be the positive impacts of this regulation? Non acceptance of the use of such out dated punitive methods of controlling or training a dog. Improved welfare during training. Move away from seeing behaviour as something to be suppressed or dealt with through force. Irresponsible or incorrect use would not cause injury or distress to dogs.
- What would be the negative impacts of the regulation, including costs of complying? There may be those that claim that a dog is only still alive and able to be kept through the use of a prong collar for control. This is a questionable justification. However, there are many other less punitive ways of controlling dogs. Costs of compliance – this is out of my area of knowledge but one perceived problem would be how this area, if legislated for, could infact be policed practically.
- Would a transitional or phase in period be required to manage these impacts? If so, how long would be appropriate? People would need to be given information about other options and there may be a crossover period where warnings and education are given first offences.
- Are there any unintended consequences? Possible increased reliance on other methods such as electronic devices. People ignoring the legislation through a belief that they are not causing emotional distress

by using one on their dog. Increase in euthanasia of dogs that are perceived to require a prong collar to remain alive.

- Do you think the regulation will achieve its aim? Unfortunately no as there is no way of effectively monitoring their use. I absolutely would like to see them prohibited but am doubtful that an effective means of enforcing this can be put in place. Also, as abhorrent as they are, there are levels of use, ranging from abusive to minimal and only for certain areas of training. It is debatable that emotional welfare could be proved to have been compromised in all cases. Actual physical abuse would be dealt with under other areas of Welfare law. Is there a historical need for tighter regulation around the use of prong collars? Elsewhere in the proposal it is noted that tighter regulation around other areas (tethering) could have made fines or prosecution possible in cases in the past. Is there a demonstrable need to regulate the use of prong collars?
- Is the current issue being managed adequately by codes of welfare or other □instruments under this Act? □No, as demonstrated quite completely by Seven Sharp's coverage of a whole training club openly using prong collars on television clearly unaware that they were in fact not to be used under the Welfare codes. None of the journalists commented to say that the codes actually already state that prong collars are not to be used. Reading viewer feedback on facebook, very few if any people knew that they were already not to be used. The other area of difficulty is proving, to the satisfaction of those involved, that pain/distress has been cause and that welfare has been compromised.
- Are there any non-regulatory options that would be more effective? Not selling them. Greater awareness of alternative training methods.
- Has the right conduct been targeted? I think that the sale of these collars needs to be prohibited. If we don't want people to use something we need to regulate the availability. Not being able to buy one easily will also hopefully stimulate dialogue around other options. Intentional harm and distress needs to be targeted.
- Is the right person being held responsible? Tricky as the proposed legislation does not address intent. If by using a collar you are intending to cause pain to change behaviour then you are purposefully causing pain and distress. An owner purchasing one and using it under the guidance of a trainer may not be fully aware of the implications of using such a device or the alternative training methods available. As above, sellers should also be held accountable as they are supplying a demand. This is an area that is potentially easier to police. I think (but am not certain) that Trade Me already does not allow their sale.
- Are there any exemptions or defences that should apply? I do not think that Police or other services should be exempt. If a dog they are wanting to

take into public to use requires the use of such a device the question would need to be asked as to the suitability of that dog for public service. Many police trainers do not use punitive methods as they have been shown to be less effective than other more positive methods.

- Are the penalties appropriate to the severity of the offence? Yes.
- Is the right type of offence (regulatory or infringement) proposed? I am not fully conversant with regulation to comment here.
- It is important that the regulatory proposals will not place an unjustifiable limitation \(\text{on} \) a person's religious or cultural practices. Are there any religious or cultural practices that would be impacted by the proposals? \(\text{Certain people enjoy training certain breeds in certain contact or so called "high level" sports involving controlled aggression. I do not think that a prong collar is required for this training. There are trainers who have achieved success without the use of such collars. Just because someone enjoys something does not mean that it is ok to do. People used to enjoy bull baiting, cock fighting and bear dancing. I am unaware of any cultural reason why you would wish to cause pain to control a dog through the use of a prong collar. "Having always done so" is not a valid argument.

5. Dogs - injuries from collars or tethers

I agree with the proposal to make this area easier to regulate given that it is an identified area of non compliance and frequent offending.

Are the restrictions are the right level? They are.

Should there be other restrictions such as 'must not prevent drinking', or fewer restrictions? I think there should be the addition of "must not prevent access to drinking water". However, this is covered under other areas of the welfare codes, such as access to food and water.

Would it be appropriate for this regulation to cover all species restrained by a collar or tether? Yes absolutely. There are several goats that live tethered at the side of the road in our area. This is obviously a common practice and goats require protection.

6. Dogs - muzzling a dog

I agree with the proposal to make this area easier to regulate and enforce given that it is an area of non compliance.

Should the regulation also specify that the dog must be able to drink? Yes absolutely or at least be given regular access to drinking water. However, if a dog cannot drink while muzzled it is unlikely to be able to pant so this situation

should not arise. Barking muzzles that hold the mouth shut would need to be investigated further.

Are there legitimate times when a dog should be muzzled in such a way it cannot pant or drink? No. If that level of restriction is required then there are other ways to contain or immobilize a dog such as with veterinary sedation. Restricting access to water can be achieved by removing sources of water. It is a basic requirement that dogs have access to water. Panting not only serves to dissipate heat but is also a communication tool to indicate stress or discomfort. There is no reason why a dog should be prevented from cooling itself, they have no other options for this.

If more restrictive muzzles are allowed should there be a stipulation that these cannot be used if the dog is exercising or otherwise at risk of over heating? Yes.

Is the penalty likely to be effective in changing muzzling behaviour? I do not know what types of offences are seen with regards to muzzling. It is unlikely that people who are in breach of the codes are suddenly going to change their practices because of a change in wording. However, if the change in wording allows greater powers of enforcement then this should help change behaviours.

7. Dogs - dry and shaded shelter

I agree with the wording change in the proposal. Many dogs are kept in kennels in full sun with little shading or in kennels that are poorly insulated and draughty. That said, dogs will dig themselves a dust hole in hot weather/cold weather to benefit from the thermal properties of dirt. Provision of a suitable kennel under the proposal should be made available, whether or not the dog chooses to use it.

Are the protections for confined dogs adequate or too onerous? Adequate. They are aiming to allow greater enforcement power.

Are there legitimate situations where dogs are regularly confined for long periods where access to a dry and shady area is not feasible? I am unaware of such a situation. Some types of farm work will require dogs to be out in the elements without opportunities to seek shade. However, they are not confined in these situations and can find shade amongst bushes, creeks and when resting with handlers. Confining a dog in a full sun position is not necessary. If travelling or away from home you can provide shelter. Unforseen disaster situations.

8. Dogs – left in vehicles

This is a difficult area to regulate due to the unintentional nature of heat stroke in many cases and the broad range of symptoms. It is also open to individual interpretation. Ideally dogs should not be left in cars on hot or even warm

days. It is also dependent on time, outside temperature, breed of dog, age of dog. As stated, actions that breach the proposal are unlikely to be deliberate so education is a key part of this area of dog welfare.

Does the offence deal with sufficiently straight forward issues of fact to be an infringement offence? It should be no higher unless death occurs. Until this point unfortunately it is difficult to be qualitative or quantitative about the level of distress and harm caused. Warnings are one way to allow for education first to hopefully prevent reoffending through ignorance.

The fact that people continue to do this means that the potential risk of harm to their dog is not taken seriously and is not a sufficient deterrent in itself.

9.Dogs – secured on moving vehicles

I agree with the proposal. However, as described, it is difficult to police as welfare officers cannot stop vehicles.

10. Dogs and cats - drowning

I agree with the proposal to prohibit the drowning to death of any dog or cat. It is unnecessary, intentionally cruel and is not a humane way to dispose of a creature.

I do not follow the legislative wording of "There is a need to be conscious that greater clarity is being traded for potential downgrading of section 12(c) of the Act. At least one person has been convicted for drowning dogs but that was a charge of animal cruelty under the previous Animals Protection Act 1960."

General Comments

- 4. I have been involved with the Breeding, Showing and Hunting of Weimaraners since 1982. During this time I have initially docked and more latterly banded my puppies tails and carried out the removal of dew claws for at least 25 years.
- 61. Dogs dew Claws Dogs Code of Welfare 2010

Articulated dew caws are firmly attached to the leg. Most frong limb dew claw are articulated. The removal often requires the bone to be cut through. This can result in complications including pain, haemorrhage, infection and scarring if not performed correctly.

Answer: If performed correctly, there is no bone to cut through, there is no bleeding and only momentary pain. Most breeders are scrupulously conscious of sterile conditions and there is no chance of infection.

Articulated dew claws may function to prevent foot injury by providing support when running and to keep objects steady while a dog is chewing them.

Answer: This statement is from vets who often do not have dogs of their own, and have not witnessed how versatile dogs are.

Many dogs are extremely fast runners and they do not have dew claws to provide support. I personally have not witnessed any foot injury by a dog without dew claws.

Dogs used their front feet to hold objects steady while chewing them - not dew claws.

Many breeders remove dew claws on pupples in the first week of life, because soon after birth the dew claws are more like fingernails than appendages. At that young age dew claws can be removed easily and no stitches are required.

- They are higher up on the leg so they don't get any wear in the normal course of walking.
- If they are allowed to get long, the quick will grow proportionately, making it more difficult to keep the toenail short.
- Not to mention the fact tht dogs with dew claws who also like to dig a
 lot, will sometimes irritate the dew claw, or even break the dew claw
 bone (not all dew claws have bones). This could happen when
 reaching through a chain link fence or something similar.
- If the dew claws on a dogs front or rear legs seem to easily get caught on things, then they could easily rip off – which would be very painful for the dog. I have heard of cases of this happening.

62. Dogs - Tail Docking - Current State: Dogs Code of Welfare 2010

Dogs' tails have a function in terms of balance and a means of communication with other dogs and humans. Research has shown that a longer tail is more effective at conveying different cues such as those provided by tail motion.

Answer: Sheep do not lack balance when climbing up and down hills so balance does not come into the equation. Dogs have other means of conveying cues other than those provided by tail motion – ears, eyes, head carriage to name a few.

Docked dogs are strong swimmers and agile runners. If the shortening of tails were to affect the dog's ability to swim and run, then there would be many dogs that do not partake in these sort of activities. This is an emotive argument that contains no facts. It is used solely to introduce emotion into the argument.

Tail injuries represent only a small percentage of why dogs are presented to a veterinary clinic. Most research studies report that the prevalence of tail injuries represents less than 1 percent of all veterinary clinic visits.

Answer – Because those dogs whose tails are prone to injury are shortened so vets don't get to see them.

How will this regulation help: Minimises the level of pain and distress caused.

The tail is shortened in puppies under 4 days of age, who cannot stand, see or hear and the pain receptors are not fully developed. No pain or distress is caused. Shortening tails is a minor procedure, must easier than the body piercing of thousands of our children.

There is documented evidence from reputable and respected veterinary surgeons that a puppy's nervous system is not fully developed in early days of life. Further, there is evidence to suggest that it is highly probable very young puppies have a comparable absence of sensitivity to pain during the first few days of life. This contrasts with the newborns of many other species (e.g. lamb, piglet and human) in which all of these senses are relatively highly developed at birth and is a direct consequence of the somewhat 'immature' state pups are born in.

Veterinarians advocate spaying to prevent possible health problems in female dogs. This is a prophylactic procedure, the same as shortening a dog's tail to prevent potential future injury.

There remains no scientific evidence that docking pupples causes pain or is cruel.

I oppose the introduction of the banning of dog's tail shortening, and contend that this is NOT in the best interest and welfare of the dogs.

Conclusion

Our organisation seeks both appropriate care and welfare standards for all animals including dogs. We however consider that the proposals as set out may have other unintended implications which in and of themselves will not meet the intent or care standards proposed. We suggest that as long standing dog breeders we and our members will be well placed to assist officials and at the very least should not be ignored.

Proposed Animal Welfare Regulations.

13 May, 2016

Background.

This submission is made on behalf of Dogsport New Zealand Incorporated (DSNZ). Our membership is dedicated to utilising & preserving the temperament and proud working heritage of European working breeds such as German Shepherds, Rottweilers, Dobermanns and Belgian Shepherds through the internationally recognised program known as Dogsport in NZ (also known as IPO or Schutzhund in non-English speaking countries). These are the primary breeds used by Police, Military and multiple other agencies who utilise Service K9s around the world. One of the original intents of Dogsport was to provide a breeding suitability test that actually tests the genetic suitability of the dog for service work, while also revealing any inherent traits that would exclude it from a responsible breeding program for service dogs.

Worldwide, Dogsport trials are held at local, regional and international levels within the breeds and also between all of the recognised working breeds, under the international regulations approved by the Federation Cynologique Internationale (FCI), which is the parent organisation for all the recognised kennel clubs across the world - based in Brussels, Belgium. The sport is akin to dressage and/or show jumping in the horse world and requires the same dedication from the handler to title a dog with suitable temperament as it would a horse rider and with a similarly suitable competition horse.

DSNZ was incorporated in 1994 and the membership of DSNZ is split almost 50/50 between males and females, the occupations of members range from medicine to law to finance to university lecturer, to trades people and self-employed and the age of members range from 30s through to 60s. Many of our members have two or more working line dogs competing in Dogsport trials.

Submission.

The proposed Animal Welfare Regulations would make the use of a prong collar an offence and make prongs illegal.

Section 10.2 The Proposals, sub section 4. Dogs – Pinch and prong collars.

What is the problem? If misused, pinch and prong collars can cause pain and distress.

DSNZ completely agree with that statement, with emphasis on the word "misused". We would submit that any piece of equipment from a flat leather collar to the widely used choke chains can be misused causing pain and distress.



We also submit that the use of prong collars is currently limited to a relatively small number of dog handlers using them knowledgeably when compared to the number of choke chains and haltis that are currently being used. Has it been demonstrated that cruelty from prong collar usage is over represented in current cases of dog abuse? HUHA is running a purely emotive campaign in an attempt to have prong collars and have their use completely banned. The emotive nature of the opposition's stance on prong collars is due to its appearance of the collar and not based on the positive outcomes that result from the correct use of this piece of equipment.

It is being portrayed as a medieval piece of equipment therefore "it must be bad". This is purely an argument from emotion and certainly does not stem from knowledge of how to, or when to use the collar. In the Seven Sharp program that featured on TVNZ on Thursday 12 May, HUHA provided a picture of a dog with neck wounds that were allegedly caused by a prong collar. It was stated, in the program, that this picture had been sourced from overseas. Where is the evidence of prong collar injuries in New Zealand?

An analogy can be made between a prong collar and the bit in a horse's mouth. The primary function of both pieces of equipment is to communicate with the animal, without supressing a desired behaviour. The rider's intention is to guide the horse's speed and direction via the bit and stirrups.

A bit can also be misused and create distrust in a horse's mind towards it, based on previous negative experiences. The abuse comes from the person's attitude towards the animal, which then reflects in their misuse of the equipment. An abusive mind set isn't "magically" eliminated due to lack of access to equipment, it will manifest itself regardless. It is certainly not the equipment that is inherently abusive in its design or function – regardless of whether it is the bit, stirrups or prong collar. The intention of the bit and stirrups is not purely to provide the means by which to wrench on the horse's mouth or to kick it in the sides. On the contrary, they are a means by which to communicate speed and direction to an active and willing participant. Similarly, a prong collar can and does allow a dog to maintain motivated behaviour and yet still be directed and positioned with absolutely minimal handler intervention (we like to compare it to "power steering").

Dogsport New Zealand understand that this claim is counter intuitive to people who aren't familiar with the use of prong collars and are basing their judgement purely on the appearance of the actual prongs.

Publically acceptable dog training equipment such as choker chains, haltis collars and harnesses – are unable to properly guide a motivated dog.

A choker collar is only effective if it jolts the dog out of position or direction and cuts off the air supply. Studies have shown that breeds prone to Cervical Vertebral Instability (CVI) e.g. Dobermans, Great Dunes and Basset Hounds show an increase in the incidence of developing CVI (Cervical



Vertebral Instability or "Wobblers syndrome") from the use of choke chains and haltis. A better option is a prong collar as it significantly reduces stress on the spinal column.

A move to ban this very effective (and humane) piece of equipment based on its appearance alone, is to effect policy on emotion and not on reason and the demonstrable evidence that dogs who've been properly trained, respond very positively to the sight of a prong collar and even during the actual use of it.

That being said - DSNZ strongly support legislation to prevent cruelty to any animal and the prosecution of offenders.

A person, who is passionate about training dogs for an internationally recognised sport and aiming for titles that reflect positively on the quality of their dog and of their training, isn't going to inflict undue pain and stress on their dog. The ethics of doing so aside, this is counter-productive and will ultimately detract from the quality of the performance. Serious trainers of any animal be it dogs or horses invest a lot of time and money into the process of getting their animal to its full potential.

The new regulations will have the effect of penalising intelligent, dedicated, experienced and knowledgeable trainers. These dogs enjoy amongst the highest standard of training and care in the country (or depriving them of an effective and very humane training tool when used correctly). Surely that should never be the outcome of animal welfare laws, as that is counter to the purpose of the main legislation, the Animal Welfare Act. The focus must be on animal abuse, not the use of specific training tools, given any tool can be used abusively.

Part 1 Care of animals

9 Purpose

(1)

The purpose of this Part is to ensure that owners of animals and persons in charge of animals attend properly to the welfare of those animals.

(2)

This Part accordingly—

(a)

requires owners of animals, and persons in charge of animals, to take all reasonable steps to ensure that the physical, health, and behavioural needs of the animals are met in accordance with both—

good practice; and

(ii)

(i)

scientific knowledge; and



(b)

requires owners of ill or injured animals, and persons in charge of such animals, to ensure that the animals receive treatment that alleviates any unreasonable or unnecessary pain or distress from which the animals are suffering; and

(c)

imposes restrictions on the carrying out of surgical procedures on animals; and

(d)

provides for the classification of the types of surgical procedures that may be performed on animals; and

(e)

specifies the persons or classes of persons who may perform each class of such surgical procedures; and

(f)

specifies certain minimum conditions that must be observed in relation to the transportation of animals.

Section 9(2)(b): amended, on 10 May 2015, by section 11(1) of the Animal Welfare Amendment Act (No 2) 2015 (2015 No 49).

However, banning a piece of training equipment, won't achieve the desired result – curbing the animal abuse that is prevalent in New Zealand.

Many dogs suffer stress from owners who view them through an anthropomorphic lens and therefore have never fully understood the mind of their dog. Instead, it is treated either as a quasi-child or as a status symbol – leading to a variety of behavioural problems like unwarranted aggression, separation anxiety, fear-biting, fear of loud noises, etc., etc., etc.

DSNZ stance is that rather than restricting the training tools, the focus needs to be on animal abuse. Rather than banning the prong collar, the focus should be on criminalising abuse of the dog, not penalising the use of the equipment.

The DSNZ training program utilises Learning Theory, we focus on Reward Schedules and utilising the Four Reinforcement Quadrants. The vast majority of our foundation training is based around positive rewards for displaying desired behaviour and marking undesired behaviours with a non-reinforcement cue (basically asking the dog to "try again"). A collar correction would only be used to specifically teach the dog to find balance between its mood, its point of focus and its position, especially where a primary reinforcer (food) or a secondary reinforcer (praise) is inappropriate and/or distracting to the dog.

The corner-stone of our training is that the dog's final performance must be joyful, engaged and motivated. Any evidence of a fearful or suppressed dog will invariably result in a point's penalty. These are not just empty claims – our dog's overtly positive attitudes to their prong collars are



testable and repeatable as evidence of our training ethos and by relentless striving to be clear in our communication with them.

One thing we can't train our dogs to do is to lie for us!

But they CAN demonstrably counter the claim that prong collars are inherently cruel.
