OMARs with an uncertain status

These OMARs have not been used for a significant period of time. Therefore the requirements may have changed without the Ministry for Primary Industries knowledge.

If an exporter can provide the current import conditions, and the requirements still match, the certificate and the OMARs will be moved back into the published list of export certificates and OMAR's.

1. Statutory authority

Pursuant to section 60 of the Animal Products Act 1999, I notify the following overseas market access requirements, entitled Horses to Brazil.

This notice takes effect from date of signing.

2. Brazilian Requirements

Horses exported from New Zealand to Brazil must comply with the import regulations of Brazil listed in this notice as follows.

- 2.1 An official veterinarian authorised by the New Zealand Ministry of Agriculture and Forestry must certify after due enquiry the following:
 - 2.1.1 The horses were continuously resident in New Zealand or Australia for at least the last 6 months prior to export or since birth.
 - 2.1.2 No cases of the following diseases have occurred in New Zealand during the 2 years prior to export:

African horse sickness contagious equine metritis equine influenza equine encephalomyelitis (VEE, EEE, WEE and St. Louis)

Borna disease dourine

epizootic lymphangitis horse pox surra anthrax equine piroplasmosis glanders vesicular stomatitis

- 2.1.3 During the three months immediately prior to shipment, the horses for export did not contract equine infectious anaemia, equine rhinopneumonitis (EHV-1), equine influenza (type A), equine viral arteritis (EVA), anthrax, Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis, epizootic lymphangitis, glanders or any other notifiable disease or been in any establishment where these diseases have occurred.
- 2.1.4 During the 15 days prior to shipment, the horses for export were isolated under the supervision of a veterinary officer during which time they were subjected to an agar gel immunodiffusion (Coggins) test with negative results for equine infectious anaemia (EIA)
- 2.1.5 The horses for export were examined at least 24 hours prior to shipment and were free of clinical signs of infectious and contagious diseases and were free from external parasites.
- 2.1.6 The horses for export were transported directly from the establishment of origin to the point of shipment in vehicles which were previously cleaned and disinfected. During transport, the horses did not have any contact with other horses not of the same health status.

3. Definitions

For the purposes of this document:

Any term or expression that is defined in the Animal Products Act 1999 and used, but not defined in this document, has the same meaning as in this Act.

Explanatory note

These overseas market access requirements are drafted on the current export certificate for the exportation of horses to Brazil dated 26 July 1999, based on conditions supplied in July 1999.
