Our Purpose

The Ministry for Primary Industries works to safeguard New Zealanders' way of life well into the future. To ensure this, we have a vision where **New Zealand is the world's most sustainable provider of high-value food and primary products.**

This means MPI enabling the primary sector to thrive by promoting innovation in fishing and farming practices, encouraging the use of new technologies and investing in scientific research to benefit the primary sector. Looking to the future, MPI regulates to protect New Zealand's natural environment by encouraging changes to sustainable fishing and farming practices, and preventing diseases and pests from entering New Zealand. We are responsible for regulating food handling and packaging practices to ensure the food is safe to eat and New Zealanders can make good food choices.

It is a big job – our influence stretches from paddock, orchard, forest and ocean, through the processing, packaging, and transportation system, all the way to market, and ultimately to consumers worldwide.



Our Backdrop

New Zealanders have a long history of innovation - it's part of our cultural DNA.

Our ability to develop, adapt and find opportunities to prosper has positioned New Zealand as a highly regarded provider of high-value food and primary products for New Zealanders, and for the rest of the world. Innovation is central to the history of our food and primary sectors and from the very start, MPI has been there to support and enable our producers to thrive.

When MPI was established in 2012, we focused on enabling the primary sector to double the value of its food and primary sector exports. We strengthened core regulatory systems, invested in a programme of innovative partnerships, and expanded work to remove barriers for New Zealand's products. Export revenues in the primary sector grew by more than 7% in the past year and the outlook across all of our sectors over the next four years remains positive. More recently, to strengthen accountability for the work we do, we introduced four business units: Biosecurity New Zealand, Fisheries New Zealand, New Zealand Food Safety, and Te Uru Rākau (Forestry New Zealand).

As we turn more attention to addressing the impact of the primary industries on the environment, and the broader issue we all face with climate change, collaboration between government and the primary sector will be key to maximising exports, improving productivity, protecting our environment and growing the economy.

A Primary Sector Council has been established for the key purpose of developing a shared vision for the future of our primary sectors, and Budget 2019 is providing more than \$122 million towards supporting more sustainable land use practice.

Key legislation and programmes that underpin much of what we do and are trying to achieve are underway which will have an enduring influence on the primary sector including:

- Management of fisheries
- Overhauling the Biosecurity Act
- Dairy Industry Restructuring Act
- One Billion Trees programme
- Meeting targets to reduce climate change and improve water quality.

To deliver on the Government's change priorities, and to build on our successful support of the primary and food sectors, we have made some modifications to our strategy. The following pages lay out our vision, four key outcomes, twelve priorities for action, and 52 deliverables in the first year of our updated strategy 'Prosperity Sustainability Protection'.

MPI's focus is on delivering four key outcomes for New Zealanders: Prosperity, Sustainability, Protection and Visible Leadership.



Prosperity: High-value food and primary sectors build prosperity for more New Zealanders

To maintain our way of life, New Zealand needs our primary industries to do well. While important for the future of the sector itself, it is also vital for the wellbeing of our communities, particularly in the regions. Prosperity means having a primary sector thriving in a way that benefits all New Zealanders. **Sustainability:** Future generations will benefit from improved environmental performance by our primary industries

For agriculture and forestry, we need clean soil and fresh air and water, and for fisheries we need plentiful stocks and a thriving marine ecosystem. A clean and green New Zealand is essential for our wellbeing and for that of future generations, and we know it is of social and cultural importance to New Zealanders.





Protection: Our products are safe and New Zealand is protected from biological risk

The biosecurity work we do saves our environment from threats of potentially devastating pests and diseases. Meanwhile, pursuing high standards of food safety and animal treatment means that all consumers know and trust that New Zealand food and primary sector products are both safe and ethically produced.

Visible Leadership: We enable the food and primary sectors to thrive

MPI will take a lead role on issues of importance to the primary sector.

Visible leadership is about how we show up, both in terms of how we operate within the organisation and in how we interact with external stakeholders – open, agile, engaging and proactive. We want to make sure we always leave our customers and stakeholders with a way forward.
