



Information on Dairy Cow Milksolids Collection

What is this form about?

This form sets the way dairy processors must keep records of the total milksolids they collect (s147(4)(a) of the Dairy Industry Restructuring Act 2001) and requires this information to be provided to MPI (s147(4)(b)).

This form will also help MPI by providing data on total milksolids collected to assist with processing applications that it receives for allocating dairy export licences under the Act (clause 2(a), Schedule 5B).

Who should complete this form?

This form is for dairy processors who collect milksolids from cows.

Section 2 — Permission to use information

Please note that the Act requires you to provide information on the total milksolids collected in the North Island. You are required to provide this information for both islands if you are an eligible participant for dairy export licences under the Act (for Schedule 5B).

You will be an eligible participant if you collect 0.1% of the total milksolids collected from New Zealand farmers in a dairy season. For example in the 2014-15 dairy season the total milksolids collected was 1.9 billion kilograms, meaning any processor who collected at least 1.9 million kilograms was an eligible participant.

Providing all other information is voluntary.

- I agree that MPI may use the information I provide in this form for other purposes under the Act such as monitoring the dairy sector.

Section 3 — Total milksolids collected for the dairy season

<input type="checkbox"/> I do not collect organic milksolids Total organic milksolids collected (kg): <i>Organic milksolids are those that are collected from a dairy farmer who — (i) is a participant in the MPI Official Organic Assurance Programme; and (ii) has produced, and has at all times otherwise dealt with, the milksolids in accordance with the programme (whether or not the milksolids are intended for export, or for use in the production of other products for export, to a market covered by the programme).</i>		

Note that if you do not keep the required records in this form or provide the required information to the Minister for Primary Industries upon request under s147(4) of the Act, without reasonable excuse, you may be committing an offence under s118 of the Act and face a fine of up to \$200,000.
